

## PARAGLIDING


As an aspiring pilot, the idea of paragliding was intriguing to say the least. I've flown in several small and large airplanes, but the feeling of being completely out in the open air is very different than being strapped into an airplane. I had never been paragliding before so I was excited, but I was also a little nervous - especially with the whole running off a cliff to launch aspect. In order to launch we had to make our way up a mountain, then essentially run down a steep decline towards a cliff which was a little unnerving. The ride up to the top of the mountain included cramming 18 people and their respective paragliding gear into one Toyota Tacoma, but that just added to the adventure. After hanging on in the bed of a truck while we sped up some winding mountain roads, our crew arrived at the launch site. The launch site was nothing more than a field on the edge of a gently sloping overhang, but that was where we were to fly. I was given a helmet, clipped into a harness with my guide and it was pretty much time to go. We took a running start, wind filled the chute and we were flying.




There are no words to describe this adventure, it simply must be experienced to be understood. However, it really did feel like flying. Feeling the wind in your face while hearing the wind gust was so unique that I truly felt like I was flying. Not like in an airplane flying, but like I am a bird flying around this valley - if that makes sense. Contrary to what one might expect, paragliding is not scary or a huge adrenaline rush like skydiving, but actually incredibly peaceful and relaxing. Floating in the air was so tranquil while looking down at the valley and village life below. Seeing houses, people walking, cars driving and cows grazing from this open aired vantage point all looked like they were part of a cartoon. The view was unreal and the perspective of watching this while silently soaring above was breathtaking. At one point we even made some really steep turns, but they were fun and not scary at all.

Our flight was in a rural mountainous area with lush green vegetation which added to the gorgeous atmosphere. There was also a light mist, in fact we almost had to cancel our flight, which would have been disappointing, as we had already been rain delayed earlier in the day. The damp weather certainly did not dampen our spirits, and I believe it actually elevated the experience.

Looking back, paragliding was an experience completely unlike anything I've ever done before and I've had my fair share of adventures. Going paragliding further ignited my love of aviation and although floating in the air and flying in a plane are two totally different situations, I truly loved every moment of it. This girl is looking forward to the next time she can strap on her wings, or paraglider to be specific, and feel the wind in her face as she takes another amazing flight.



I never would have imagined myself finishing off 2022 by catching rides from strangers in South America and sleeping in the back of semi-trucks. In fact, if you would've told me a couple of years ago I would conclude my semester abroad hitchhiking up Peru's coast for a week with someone I had met only a few months earlier, I would've probably doubted your sanity. And yet, somehow by the time one of my friends invited me to join him on an unconventional trek north at the end of last November, saying yes felt like the most natural thing in the world.

The two of us met at the tail end of August 2022, crossing paths in Peru after both signing up to study abroad in Cusco through a program called ISA (International Studies Abroad). Instead of electing a University of Utah faculty-led program, I opted to travel to Peru through an affiliate organization, one which would allow me to live with a host family, take classes from local Peruvians, and go on a variety of included excursions. The instant I found ISA's program, I knew it was precisely the kind of experience I hoped to have, and in all honesty, I now consider the final four months of 2022 to be some of the most overwhelmingly beautiful, growthpromoting, and happy months of my life.

After spending my fall semester studying Peruvian culture in Spanish, making important friendships, climbing in the Sacred Valley, and backpacking through Peru's arid mountains and dense jungle, I found myself itching for more. It seemed the more rocks I climbed and the more ruins I wandered, the more intensely I longed to continue exploring. Something about the natural world tugged and pulled at me, and I just couldn't resist its gravity.



Prior to leaving Utah, I intentionally booked my return flight a week after the semester concluded to allot myself extra time to travel independently. But here I was, with only a few days of classes remaining and no formal plans made. I had thrown around a couple of ideas with different friends, but



nothing sat right in my stomach; I just wasn't sure what kind of experience I wanted to have during my last week. But, when Kele mentioned he would love to have me join him for part of his hitchhiking trip from Cusco to Venezuela, something felt different. Bigger and more meaningful. The adventure he proposed wouldn't be easy, small, or effortless, but would instead entail uncomfortable firsts and a multiplicity of unknowns. There was something about the hugeness of the task that, though admittedly intimidating, was undeniably enticing; I couldn't say no.

In this moment of decision, I was reminded of an important truth I'd learned while reading Alastair Humphreys' book, Grand Adventures (a great read if you want to change how you think of traveling). Humphreys reminded me repeatedly that the most important step in doing something monumental after telling everyone you want to do it, is committing to it: quit your job, buy the flight, make shit happen! A couple of days later, I changed my flight to depart from Lima instead of Cusco, and then suddenly, it was settled: I had a plane to catch in a week and was 800 miles away; we needed to get moving.




On the morning of December 3rd, I bid my host family farewell, slung my backpack over my shoulders, and made my way to downtown Cusco with Kele. Despite feeling liberated in those first few minutes because everything I needed for the next week was on my back, I was also quite intimidated. I had never hitchhiked before and




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


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


silently wondered how much of our trip might be spent walking. How difficult would it be to catch a ride? Was hitchhiking all the way to Lima even realistic? I had packed minimally but was all too aware of my bag's weight and the intensity of the midday sun. I wondered if this trip was something someone like me could even do.

After taking a bus for 40 cents to get out of the city, we found ourselves standing on highway 3S, cars whizzing past us at dishearteningly fast rates. This was where the hitchhiking would begin. It was a big highway, and I was nervous at the prospect of trying to wave someone down. Despite some initial rejections, to my surprise, after only about five minutes, a pickup truck stopped. After mentioning we were headed to Limatambo, a city about 79 km west, the driver hopped out and motioned for us to throw our packs in the back. Upon climbing in, I couldn't suppress the grin sliding its way across my face. I was in the middle of Peru, sitting in the pickup of a stranger and headed on an adventure with one of my best friends beside me. I could hardly believe this life was mine.

After about an hour and a half, we arrived in Limatambo, a small but busy town. After less than ten minutes,

another driver stopped, kindly telling us to make ourselves comfortable amid an odd assortment of produce in the back of his truck. I sat on a bag of onions and stared out the back window, enjoying a new view of the Andes with each tight turn we took





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We attempted to flag people down for over an hour, but to no avail. Everyone laughed or simply smiled and shook their heads at the "crazy gringos" begging for a ride. It was dusty and hot, and we were disheartened. We tried waiting at several different spots but got rejected repeatedly. We did our best to keep our spirits up but became pretty discouraged as it grew later in the day. Eventually, we began a slow and dusty walk out of town, before Kele wisely proposed we stand next to a speed bump. It was here, a place where drivers conveniently had to slow down anyways, where we met our miracle.

Roger pulled his semi truck to the side of the road before cranking down his window to speak with us. After asking where he was headed, we hardly believed our good fortune as the word "Lima" fell out of his mouth. We couldn't help but cheer; Lima was roughly 1,000 kilometers and 16 hours away from Curahuasi, and yet we had found someone willing to pick us up!

Roger proved to be a miracle over and over again. In addition to pointing out parts of the landscape we missed, teaching us



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new words in Spanish, and buying us Chicha Morada to share at dinner, he also offered to let us sleep in the back of his empty semi-truck that night. We awoke to the rumble of the engine around 4:15 on Sunday morning, quickly rolled up our sleeping bags, and started driving into the dark that slowly turned to dawn. We spent hours stuck in standstill traffic together, chatting and laughing and staying silent much of the time too. Roger didn't just share his truck and time with us, but his patience. In total, he drove us for a day and a half,

helping us cover over 700 kilometers before dropping us off near Paracas around 9 pm.

Kele was drained from the trip, and I was not only exhausted, but incredibly sick, having thrown up while crapping myself just a few hours earlier. We decided to splurge on a \$4 taxi ride to the beach where we camped for the night. Pictures had made us expect idyllic white sand and beautiful cliffs, but instead, we were greeted by a beach covered in trash, loud music, and the smell of piss. We were too tired to care, and simply collapsed into our sleeping bags before waking up coated in sand on Monday morning. We splurged again on a breakfast that wasn't worth it, bought groceries, and realized neither of us remembered to bring a pan. We had food, fuel, and a stove, but nothing to cook in. We spent the next couple hours walking from shop to shop, restaurant to restaurant, asking if anyone had a pan they weren't using. Eventually, a kind

woman making arepas walked us over to her neighbors, Luz and Willy, who presented us with an old pot they could feasibly part with. It was rusty, with a lopsided screw hanging out the side instead of a handle, and it was perfect. We thanked our new friends profusely and headed on a hot and silent walk toward a better camping spot.




Eventually we crossed an empty lot and made our way to the water, opting to camp under a single palm tree in between several mansions sprawled down both sides of the beach. We wondered repeatedly whether someone would ask us to leave but were pleasantly surprised to remain undisturbed until the next afternoon, when one of our neighbors approached us. After asking what we were doing and where we were from, Herald offered to let us use his tent, telling us there were scorpions in the area. Upon retrieving it, he proceeded to set it up with us, ensuring we would be comfortable for the night and asking if we knew how to windsurf. After offering to teach us and leaving to arrange things, he returned, claiming he'd decided we'd be more comfortable staying in his guest house than on the beach. Thanks to Herald's immense generosity, we spent the next three nights living in luxury. We enjoyed delicious meals for free with his family, learned how to windsurf, and made unexpected friendships, before leaving for Paracas on Friday morning.









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## Lost At Sea

When husband & wife team Nathan & Kim Maker set out for a 4 day live aboard dive trip they had no idea that this day would become the biggest adventure of their life. They entered the water around 10 am on the final dive of the trip, which had a line for divers to hold onto while ascending and descending because the currents were very strong. Another diver lost her grip on the line and was being carried away by the current, so Nathan let go and went to help her get back to the line. He managed to get her back, but at that point Nathan was struggling to get himself back to the line. Like a Hollywood movie, as Nathan's wife reached out to help him, she was knocked off the line. Unable to get back, both divers were carried away from the line by the current. After unsuccessfully attempting to get below the current, they surfaced around 150 yards from the dive boat. Nathan & Kim inflated their SMB and blew their whistles but the dive boat never picked them up and eventually they were carried out of sight by the current.



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Nathan & Kim tethered themselves together and kept an optimistic outlook that the boat would find them within the next couple of hours. Nathan had been a firefighter for 22 years and his father was a Fire Chief who had taught Nathan to stay calm during stressful situations. This training certainly played a part in the decisions they made while floating alone in the ocean. Around 5 pm they saw the first coast guard plane searching for them, but the plane was too far away to signal. The first night they spotted a light in the distance which they thought was an oil rig, so the couple spent most of the night swimming in that direction. The 9 plus hours of swimming was exhausting, but may have been the only thing that kept the couple from getting hypothermia. During that first night, a big storm rolled in and by the time the storm passed, the light from the oil rig was no longer in sight.

The pair saw coast guard planes on and off during the next day, but the planes were always too far away to effectively signal. They did manage to get small drinks of water a couple of times during rain storms by holding their heads back and opening their mouths. At one-point Nathan started vomiting and Kim also had stomach issues, probably from accidental ingestion of salt water. As if being stranded in the ocean were not enough, they were also fighting off remora that were trying to attach to their legs and both suffered over 50 jellyfish stings. Nathan & Kim did see two different pods of dolphins swimming around them, which lifted their spirits and broke the monotony of floating in the ocean for hours.

On the second night, there was another round of trying to take the current and swim towards the lights of oil rigs with no success. Finally, around midnight, a coast guard plane came close enough for them to signal with their flashlights. After 38 plus hours in the ocean, Kim & Nathan Maker were rescued by a coast guard boat and taken to





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the Coast Guard cutter. Nathan commented on how great the Coast Guard team treated them, even giving the couple some of their own personal clothes to wear once aboard the cutter. Nathan and Kim Makers dive adventure had been rough, but had a happy ending.

Upon reflection of the incident, this couple was better prepared than most divers to have a safe and successful dive. They had inflatable SMBs and whistles to signal the dive boat once they surfaced. They also had flashlights, which ended up being the device they used for successfully signaling the coast guard search plane. One mistake the couple made was not having their dive computers/watches fully charged. It was the final dive of the trip and the devices had plenty of charge for the dive, so the Makers thought they would be fine. During the 2 days in the water the devices eventually ran out of power, rendering the devices and the tools they provided unusable. A key additional piece of safety equipment that the Makers are adding to their kit is a GPS signaling device, which can be used to alert rescue teams and provide them with your exact location. The entire dive community is glad the Makers story has a happy ending, but we want to help keep other divers from having the same experience. Make sure you are prepared for a successful and safe dive by having the proper safety equipment for any circumstances that may arise.



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
## Must-Have Scuba Safety Equipment


Scuba divers are notorious for spending money on amazing gear, multiple dive licenses and wonderful dive trips while often forgetting essential safety gear that could make the difference between survival and disaster when things don't go as planned. We caught up with Nate Blanchard, the owner of Aggieland Scuba (an iconic Texas Shop) and 16-year scuba instructor to discuss some of the important safety gear and smart safety practices that should be a part of your dive plan.

Nate recommended taking a refresher course to hone your skills if there has been an extended period of time between your last dive. This is especially important for new divers who may have forgotten some of the essential safety skills they learned while getting certified. Another good habit is to practice one or two skills on every dive such as removing your mask or buddy breathing.

Nate stated that all reputable dive companies should start your trip with a safety briefing which informs

divers of the location of the boats first aid kit and oxygen tank. They should also tell you the name of the boat and the radio channel they monitor in case you get picked up by another boat as well as any hazards you need to be aware of at your dive location such as strong currents. Finally, the boat should have a pre and post dive role call or a system with clip on tags insuring that all divers have safely returned to the boat after the dive. If you hear your name called twice when they are making the pre-dive roll call, change your name on the list to your last name. The last thing you want to happen is for another diver with the same name to answer "here" twice when you are not on the boat.





Nate suggested that you discuss things such as hand signals and buddy breathing with your dive partner prior to the dive. Safe divers make a dive plan and insure that both partners are on the same page and understand the plan.

As a dive shop owner Nate often witnesses divers who purchase great equipment and then forget to perform routine maintenance to keep the gear running correctly. He reminded us that regulators should be inspected every year and rebuilt every 2 years and BCDs should be inspected and rebuilt every 5 years. Following these guidelines will help eliminate potential problems that can ruin a dive or put you in a dangerous situation. Nate also suggested taking an equipment specialist class that teaches you how to care for and maintain your diving equipment.

When it comes to gear, Nate's first question was "Do you remember what you learned in your open water training course?" That every diver should have both a visual and an audible signaling device at all times. A visual signaling device is critical when surfacing in big waves, stormy weather or strong currents which can make spotting divers from a boat nearly impossible. Conditions can change quickly so a diver should always be prepared with the proper visual signaling devices. An audible signal such as a whistle or horn helps get the dive boat or other divers' attention once you have surfaced and is another critical piece of safety gear. You want to have the right equipment so you have the best chance of being spotted and picked up by the dive boat in any condition.

Let's skip ahead to the worst-case scenario, the dive boat cannot find you and you are left alone floating in the ocean. That is when a GPS signaling device is crucial so you can both alert rescue services and provide them with your location. Without a GPS signaling device, your chances of survival are significantly decreased. Garmin has rescued over 10,000 people who utilized their GPS SOS signaling device to alert authorities that they needed assistance.



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#### **Visual Safety Devices**

#### Surface Marker Buoys (SMB) & Delayed Surface Marker Buoys (DSMB)

A SMB is filled once the diver has reached the surface. The DSMB is deployed using a reel and line while divers are still underwater and has an open end or an overpressure valve to release expanding air as the DSMB rises to the surface. Both alert boats that divers are surfacing and provide a visual aid so the dive boat can identify diver's location. All divers should have a SMB or DSMB.



#### Scuba Pro Surface Marker Buoy

The Scuba Pro Surface Marker Buoy is a compact SMB that will easily fit in your BCD pocket. The 7-inch x 4.5-foot durable 210D nylon SMB features HF welded seams, a small plastic D-ring on top for attaching a flashlight or glow stick, a 40mm stainless steel D-ring on bottom for attaching a spool and a bungee loop to keep the SMB securely rolled up when not in use. The safety orange SMB can be easily inflated with a hose or by mouth utilizing the one-way integrated valve and features an over pressure / dump valve. Just grab the nylon handle and pull the DSMB from the pouch when you are ready to deploy. The 300 D polyester DSMB features a reflective strip, a clear glow stick holder and a nylon grab handle at the top. Inflate the closed cell DSMB by mouth or BCD which has a nylon webbing loop with attached stainless steel clip for attaching to a reel, an elastic storage strap, RF welded seams and an over pressure / dump valve. 

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


The Land of Adventure




#### Salto de Jimenoa Uno


#### Eco Parapente RD Paragliding



There is an additional large flat storage area and a roomy pocket for personal items that are both zipper accessible. The quality and look are phenomenal and we found the housing to be easy to understand and operate.

The housing has integrated depth and temperature sensors and the App utilizes the Bühlmann ZHL-16C algorithm with gradient factors which can be customized. The computer can be used with just about any gas mix and provides standard dive information such as depth, max depth, elapsed and total dive time, time to surface, compass and GPS location. Crucial real-time safety data such as ascent rate, no decompression time, decompression stops, surface intervals and no fly time can also be displayed. The App can be adjusted for diving at altitude and even includes a logbook, gear locker and a way to share your dives with friends and family.








Sometimes opportunities to challenge yourself show up unexpectedly. Just ask Steve Cope, a cyclist who found this out not too long ago.

Last May, Cope, who lives near Charlotte, North Carolina, was planning a road trip to Northern Virginia to pick up a pair of bike wheels when a cycling buddy told him about the 2024 Gravel Grinder National Championship & Mini G taking place May 11 in Loudoun County.

A long-time roadie who had taken up gravel riding the year before, Cope's ears perked up at the mention of a gravel race. Held in Bluemont— a rustic village with a mix of old homes, former schoolhouses, and historic buildings—the Virginia gravel event featured three distances: the 20-mile Magnifispin, the 50-mile Mini G, and the 100-mile Gravel Grinder National Championship.



"You should ride in the National Championship," the friend encouraged. "It attracts strong athletes and features a hilly course that will test your skills."

Always up for a challenge (and a fun weekend), Cope took his friend's advice and timed his Virginia trip so he could compete in the Grinder Nationals. That decision turned out to be a good one. Cope, 62, won his age category and placed 12th overall, completing the race in five hours and 17 minutes at an average speed of 19 miles per hour. Not bad for a guy who had only raced gravel a handful of times.

Cope credits his success to his strategy for the course, which consisted of two 50-mile laps. "As you ride in the race, you evaluate everybody's condition," he said. "During the first lap, I followed the main pack to learn the course. Then I picked where I was going to make my move."

"Being small, I am good on the climbs," said Cope, who is 5'5" tall and weighs 123 pounds. "I thought the finish looked tricky, so I wanted to separate from the group five miles from the finish line; that way, I could use my size as an advantage and climb the last hill before everybody else."





Proper fueling was also key given the course's remote location and limited checkpoints (one every 25 miles). To prevent bonking, Cope—who did not stop at the checkpoints— carried five gels in his jersey pocket and wore a CamelBak hydration backpack that held 60 ounces of liquid.

The Grinder Nationals was Cope's first gravel event in his home state of Virginia (he grew up in Staunton). 
"It's the best gravel race I've done," he said. "The gravel was smooth, the venue was fantastic, and the event was well organized."

What about the 2025 Grinder Nationals? Will Steve Cope be back?"

"If it weren't for a pair of bike wheels, I would have missed a great race," he said with a laugh. "Now that I've experienced the Grinder Nationals, I can't wait to ride in it again."
